Message from the President October Surprise!

On October the 8th our Chapter was notified by the Zion Lutheran Church (where we have been conducting play days for many years) that beginning January 1, 2011 our Chapter will be charged a payment for use of facilities per hour with the following guide lines:

Gym/Garden Room per hour: \$60

Classroom use per classroom per hour (for groups under 20): \$35

Sanctuary use per hour for performing groups only: \$125

Gym users, reoccurring or all day use, deposit of \$200

Your board of directors has been analyzing the impact of this policy change on our Chapter play days at Zion and has come to the conclusion that the financial impact

would be severe to continue using Zion facilities at anything like our current usage rate. For example, to continue using Zion for play days as we have in the past, the *facilities* only cost would be \$465 per day or \$4185 per year assuming 9 meeting per year. This is of course in addition to the approximately \$200 per day or \$1800 per year that we are paying for coaching fees.

To cover these facilities only costs, we would have to raise our yearly dues rate from the current \$35 per year by \$95 to a total of \$130 per year for all of our "play day" members, assuming that we could maintain our total "play day" membership at 44 persons. Alternatively, to cover these

facility only costs with a facility use play day attendee fee, we would have to charge \$33 per player per play day assuming that we are able to maintain our current average



play day attendance of 14 players. Both of these assumptions appear to be highly unlikely.

Based on this assessment, your board is planning to submit a "counter proposal" to the Church for their consideration, specifying a total facilities cost fee per day that we are willing to pay in the near term from January to June of 2011. There is of course no guarantee that this "counter proposal" facility use rate will be acceptable to Zion Church.

We are actively in the process of looking for alternative venues or sites at lower or hopefully no cost where we could conduct play day activities something like the way we have been doing at Zion Church. Our Pacifica Chapter membership can really help out by identifying venues that could be considered. Of special interest are schools or places where you are a member and could use the facilities for free or for a relatively small charge. These include places such as your church or your community center. Are any of our members currently working with or retired from local school districts and might be able to

Ukulele, C.F. Martin & Co., Style 3M. Here is a rare 1940's Martin 3M (Mahogany Model) Soprano Ukulele with original case. Classic mahogany face, back and sides with celluloid binding on top and back. Ebony fretboard with circular position markers (one missing) and C.F. Martin & Co decal on headstock; ivory celluloid binding with w-b-w-b-wb-w ply binding on front and around soundhole, with w-b-w on back; 17 T-fret ebony fretboard. There is also a C.F. Martin & Co stamp on the inside of the soundhole as well but without the "Made in USA" since it's pre-1960; no whale tail below bridge; no diamond style position markers, no pin-striping down fretboard. Total length: 21 inches; Body length: 9 & 7/16 inches; Body width: 6 & 3/8 inches; Scale length: 13 & 5/8 inches. There are lots of superficial signs of wear, including neck, back and top finish wear, as well as a small fingerboard gouge, but there are no cracks, the neck is straight and the instrument is in excellent playing condition. \$2100.

Lyre Mandolin, Calace, 1899. A highly unusual lyre mandolin in good original condition, dated 1899 and bearing the original signed label: Fratres Calace, Via Quercia 506, Neapoli, Italia. Fecerunt 1899, # 20005. Spruce top edged with ebony, and ivory; soundhole edged in rosewood and decorated with mother of pearl ornaments; nicely shaped tortoise shell scratch plate; two well-turned ivory knobs on the lyre tips; two hollow yokes with metal struts; bowl back of 28 rosewood ribs; good straight rosewood neck; rosewood fingerboard with 22 good brass frets; rosewood head; metal machine heads with ivory tuners; ebony and ivory bridge; ivory nut; original leather case in extremely poor condition; several small (appear stable) cracks as shown in pictures; total length 61 cm, scale 33.7 cm, body width 24.6 cm, depth 13 cm, nut 2.7 cm. \$7000. 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


Sarge Gerbode has an extraordinary collection of lute music posted on his site. Lute intabulations of songs can

We performed a great mix of voice/viol music types including a wonderful, technically challenging and harmonically astonishing 5 part Madrigal by Gesualdo. Extra special thanks are due to Peter Ballinger for providing viol playing parts and special vocal scores for the singers! In the afternoon session, about 8 viol players got to play through almost all of the great 6

part Fantasias by Lupo, including one of the two that have wonderful, written out ornamented bass parts.

Our next play day is Saturday November 13th at Zion Church with Roy Whelden who plans to do multi-choir Gabrieli pieces for viols in the morning, should be great! In the afternoon we will have our second Pacifica Board meeting of the year at Zion Church, starting at 1:30 pm. We have decided that the importance of the facilities rental issue discussed above merits starting the meeting earlier to allow adequate time for discussion of this critical topic. Planning for the Viols West Workshop in the summer of 2011 is proceeding. Melita Denny, our workshop coordinator, reports that Ros Morley has confirmed six faculty members so far and is preparing contracts. November 13 Play Day with Roy Whelden

Roy will coach the November Play day, with a program of multi-choir Gabrieli pieces for viols. "I have long held an interest in the music of the late European Renaissance," Roy says, "particularly the Venetian school, even though the vast majority of performances I've heard, including most of my own, have disappointed me. The energy of these performances seems somehow misplaced. Occasionally, I've detected glimmers of what seems to be the true nature of this music. These glimpses were exciting, on a deep and subtle level—yet the secrets of this music, I've thought, are still largely hidden. Some years ago, I read this acutely perceptive comment made by Stravinsky during the 1950s after hearing a concert in Venice of the music of the Gabrielis, Cipriano de Rore, and Willaert: 'When will musicians learn that the point of Gabrieli's music is rhythmic, not harmonic? When will they stop trying to make mass choral effects out of simple harmonic changes and bring out, articulate, those marvelous rhythmic inventions? Garbieli is rhythmic counterpoint.' This from a modern master who worked all his life in similar directions! The Pacifica Gamba Society can explore some of this rhythmically complex, poly-choral, spatial music during the November session at Zion Lutheran Church."

Roy grew up in Pennsylvania and his native New Hampshire playing trumpet and cello. After trumpet and music theory studies at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, NY, he went on to Indiana University in Bloomington where he got his advanced degrees and became interested in the viola da gamba. He studied medieval music (concentrating on the vielle and viola da gamba) with Thomas Binkley there and also with John Hsu in Ithaca, New York, and then began an international career as a performer, composer and teacher of viol and medieval fiddle. The many ensembles with which he has been affiliated include Sequentia (Cologne), the Boston Camerata and the Bay Area groups American Baroque and Ensemble Alcatraz.

His energies now are focused on the Galax Quartet, a group playing in an unusual eighteenth century string quartet configuration—two violins (sometimes violin/viola), viola da gamba and cello—originated by the composer and last gamba virtuoso Carl Friedrich Abel. The classical repertoire for this particular ensemble is rather meagre and, essentially, died along with Abel in 1787. For this reason, the Galax Quartet has been busy during the last five years commissioning modern composers to create new works for the ensemble. Their first recording will be released soon on the Innova record label; On Cold Mountain—Songs on the Poetry of Gary Snyder contains four new song cycles created for the contralto Karen Clark and the quartet by Fred Frith, W.A. Matheiu, Robert Morris, and Whelden.

Roy's composing credits are substantial. Early Music America called him a "key figure in the world of new



music" and he has been profiled as composer and gambist by Minnesota Public Radio. His compositions have been recorded on the New Albion label and are available on iTunes: Galax—music for viola da gamba, Like a Passing River, Shock of the Old.
