# Master Class with Lisa Terry

Our March 11 play day will feature visiting professional Lisa Terry as coach. Lisa lives in New York, where she teaches and performs as a member of Parthenia, the Dryden Ensemble and ARTEK. In addition to the morning's coaching, Lisa will hold a master class in the afternoon. Only three slots are available for individuals or ensembles. This article aims to demonstrate why you should get yourself or your ensemble into one of those slots!

Most of you have probably been in the audience for a master class, whether on viol, or some other instrument. Many of you, however, may not have participated as a student in a master class. Many cite fear as their main reason for not participating in a master class. Feelings such as "I can't play in public," or, "I don't play anything well enough" are common.

However, a master class is not a public performance. It is more of an ordinary lesson, in which other people also happen to be in the room. The very words "master class" inspire an image of a demi-god come to earth, whereas "lesson open to the public" yields a more realistic image: that this is a dialogue between teacher and student, one in which the teacher wishes only to help the student and the student wants to learn. There is no expectation of level or ability. The teacher addresses her comments where she thinks they will do the most good. Most of all, the teacher is not playing for the audience; she is there for the student. And, every audience member will relate to the student up front.

## Master class in March

A teacher may focus on technique, interpretation, or both in her comments. Some players may feel that they barely have a "technique", much less an interpretation, and so what would they get out of a master class? In fact, you may discover that you do have

preferences about the music, and reasons for doing things the way you do. To quote, "part of being a ing a good good musician is having opinions, and a master class is a great way to find out what yours are." The teacher will have her own style and technique, and they are most likely different from yours. Being

presented with a differing perspective will help you to consciously articulate your own.

The fear of public performance is just one of many feelings that can partially immobilize a participating student. No less distracting might be the desire to impress, either the teacher or audience. In fact, every time you sit down to play, distracting thoughts go through your head. Maybe you are thinking about a work problem, or you are thinking about changing your strings. The wonderful thing about participating in a master class is that you will play your piece several times, and no matter what is distracting you, you will play better each successive time. By the second or third time, you may be able to incorporate some of the teacher's suggestions, and see how they feel.

Finally, there is no "substitute for feeling what a teacher says in your muscles rather than in your ears/brain." Participating as a student gives you the chance to do just that, in the context of working with a professional you might not otherwise encounter. And because you will be given a lot of suggestions/ information in a short time, one person recommends having a friend in the audience who will take noteson a copy of the music-of the teacher's comments. Having a recording made is also a very useful tool.

As someone who has herself participated in a master class, I can attest it is an invaluable experience. Preparing for the class is a great exercise in itself, and you will find that you get more out of observing a master class after you have participated yourself.


