New Music for Gamba Quartet

The Galax Quartet on April 29

Quartet – David Wilson and Joseph Edelberg, violins; Roy Whelden, viola da gamba; David Morris, 'cello – will present an unusual and provocative concert at the College Avenue Presbyterian Church (5951 College Avenue, Oakland CA). Not only will there be a world premiere of a quartet recently commissioned by the quartet from the award winning San Francisco composer Belinda Reynolds, there will be a New World premiere of a quartet by Carl Friedrich Abel (d. 1787) and a rare performance of the electro-acoustic composer Carl Stone's Quartet from 1994. These three quartets, taken as a whole, represent three distinct approaches to the repertoire of what might be called the 'gamba quartet'.

Abel's Quartet no. 4 in A major was part of the first string quartet collection ever published in England. (I'm now using the term 'string quartet' in the classical sense: two violins, viola and cello.) In fact, its publication date of 1769 makes it one of the earliest quartets ever published in Europe, for Franz Joseph Haydn, universally recognized as the father of the string quartet medium, began writing them only around 1760 when he was in his late 20s. Abel's A major Quartet was arranged sometime during the 18th century - perhaps by the composer himself or someone who knew of the composer's performance predilections - for violin, viola, viola da gamba and 'cello. For our performance, we procured a copy of the original manuscript parts - lying overlooked until very recently - from the archives of the Lambach Monastery in Austria. Peter Ballinger, of PRB Publications, has expressed interest in bringing out an edition of this delightful work.

xtending the repertoire for the 'gamba' quartet will, in large part, be the commissioning of new works from modern composers. We were lucky have found a first commissioning partner in Ms.—Keynolds. Not only was she familiar with our instruments—she had worked with the early instrument ensemble American Baroque on the

recording Shock of the Old (Santa Fe New Music 0513) — she is also a facile collaborator in a workshop setting. In fact, the give and take of the workshop is her preferred model for musical creation. She has produced a wonderful, image-provoking piece for us titled Envision, somewhat reminiscent, at least in its large-scale structure, of a multi-sectional, multi-tempo Toccata of Frescobaldi.

Marin Headlands Workshop for Recorders and Viols

Come Make Music May 18-20

Spring hills of the Marin headlands will again ring with the sweet harmonies of recorders, viols, and perhaps a psaltery or drum on May 18-20 this year. Intermediate and advanced players are warmly invited to join members of the sponsoring East Bay Chapter of the American Recorder Society, a SFEMS affiliate, at this annual musical workshop. Music making begins on Friday and continues through Sunday afternoon, including also one- and two-day options.

This year's faculty, a rich resource to inspire individual growth and collective delight, will include David Barnett, Annette Bauer, Letitia Berlin, Tom Bickley, Frances Blaker, Louise Carslake, Frances Feldon, Eileen Hadidian, Peter Maund, and Fred Palmer. Music will come from lands of Spain, Ireland, Italy, Germany, France, Switzerland, and the New World, from composers ancient to contemporary. 

Carl Stone's Quartet from 1994 represents yet a third approach to augmenting the repertoire of the Galax

Quartet: we proposition omposers whose work we find attractive, asking them if they have material which would be suitable for us. More often than not they do and are enthusiastic to have it performed. At this point we have to mutually commit to re-working the piece for our instruments. Such was the case with Mr. Stone. His striking quartet, Mae Ploy, reflects his predilection for Japanese titles, though the music itself may be only minimally influenced by Japanese musical traditions. We will be performing the first movement of this work.

oth Ms Reynolds and Mr. Stone will be present at the concert and will discuss their pieces. You are invited to join the Galax Quartet at 7:30 on April 29th at the College Avenue Presbyterian Church. Admission is by free will donation to the church's food for the homeless program. This concert is part of the church's "Music that Cooks" series. There will also be an open rehearsal on April 26 at 8:00 at Point Richmond's First United Methodist Church (201 Martina Street) with at least one, possibly both, of the composers present. Admission is by a suggested \$10 donation.

This concert and the Reynolds commission are supported by grants from the American Composers Forum and the East Bay Fund for the Arts. We wish to thank the many generous individuals from the San Francisco Bay Area and beyond who donated to this project.
