Join us for our Zoom PlayDay with coach Alexa Haynes-Pilon Sat., Sept. 12, 9:30-11:00 am

A performer on baroque cello, viola da gamba, baroque bassoon and dulcian, our coach **Alexa Haynes-Pilon** was recently described by Early Music America as "a special artist with a brilliant future." She performs regularly with early music ensembles across North America and is the principal cellist of Musica Angelica Baroque Orchestra, a co-director and cellist/gambist with Musica Pacifica, and a co-founder of Ensemble Bizarria, a Los Angeles-based early music chamber ensemble. She co-founded and is co-Artistic Director of Los Angeles Baroque (LAB), a community baroque orchestra based in South Pasadena, CA.

Alexa has been on faculty at the San Francisco Early Music Society workshops, the Port Townsend Early Music Workshop near Seattle, and at the Road Scholar Hidden Valley workshop in Carmel Valley, CA,.

At the University of Toronto, Alexa studied baroque cello with Christina Mahler and viola da gamba with Joelle Morton. She recently finished her doctoral studies at the University of Southern California, studying baroque cello and viola da gamba with William Skeen and baroque bassoon and dulcian with Charlie Koster.



Program: Still Life with Viols

We will explore consorts thematically linked to objects from still-life artwork— bells, ink, windows, flowers, etc. Composers will include Holborne, Wilbye, Byrd, Gibbons and Jenkins.

Since we have a variety of viol sizes, we'll not be doing "Music-Minus-One." Instead, you will hear all the parts for each piece; I have recorded myself playing most if not all of the parts.

Take this as an opportunity to challenge yourself: Have you always wanted to learn how to read treble or bass clef on a tenor viol? Bass players, do you need to challenge yourself on your alto clef sight-reading skills? Treble players, do you need to work on your bow arm/bow weight? I encourage each of you to set a challenge or goal for yourself and work on it during the playalong session! No one (except your house-mates and pets) will hear you, so this is a great moment for some personal assessment and growth. –Alexa

Registering for the PlayDay Deadline: NOON, Thursday, Sept. 10

I. Go to <u>our website</u> and log in*. (Note: each member logs in and signs up separately.)

2. Under Events / PlayDay Registration, fill out and submit the form. A confirmation email will follow. * If you haven't yet activated or renewed your membership, click <u>HERE</u> for how-to instructions.

Registering and getting music for our PlayDay

1. <u>Click here</u> to get to Pacifica's website, then log in (easy if you've saved your Member ID and Password).

2. Once logged in, you'll be able to go to Events/PlayDay Registration with instructions for registering and for getting to Google Drive (a simple click) where we've stored pdfs of all the parts & scores.

3. In Google Drive first open the file called "START HERE." This is a letter from our coach Alexa, listing the program order, the parts in each piece and their clefs, and the number of pages in the score. You might want to print it out as a reference.

4. Notice that there's a folder for each piece of music we'll be playing. Open a folder, then open your chosen part or the score. Print it out (or download it to your tablet). Repeat this step for each of the 7 pieces.

Once you register, Cindi, our Zoom host, will send out a confirmation email with a **link to our Zoom meeting** and helpful notes.

She'll send another email reminder to all registrants at 5pm the Friday evening before.

Using ZOOM

If you've never used Zoom, we highly recommend learning the basics so that you can have a good experience and not miss anything. The Seniors Guide website offers "A Step by-Step Guide to a Zoom meeting," including how to Download Zoom, Join a Zoom meeting and Participate in a meeting. Here are a few tips:

Muting your microphone

Your computer microphone is pretty sensitive, and if you are unmuted, it can pick up a lot of your background noise, like moving your chair or shuffling music.

• Find the button that looks like a microphone on the bottom left corner of the Zoom screen.


Time to renew your membership?

HANDY TIP:

Copy and paste this Zoom link into your digital calendar for Sept. 12 as part of your entry for our PlayDay event

- If the microphone has a red line through it, you are muted and no one can hear you.
- If the microphone has no red line through it, your mike is live and every little noise in your room can be heard.
- <u>To mute</u>, click the mike icon (and then a diagonal red line will appear through the icon).
- <u>To unmute</u>, click the icon again. (It's a toggle switch: on/off/on/off...)

Chat

If you have a question or comment during the session, please enter it by clicking the Chat button, which looks like a speech bubble; it's at the bottom of the Zoom screen. You can send a message to everyone, to the host, or anyone else.

FIRE EVACUATION NEWS from our members


From Marilyn Cantey in Santa Cruz:

"I was evacuated on Thursday. So far the house is ok, so viol and my Steinway piano are ok. Wasn't much fun packing for a horse, 2 dogs, computers, financials, etc. But we are safe."

From Ellen Fisher

in Paradise Valley Estates, a retirement community in Fairfield:

"We had a mandatory evacuation for less than 24 hours; I took one of my 4 viols. We were able to return the next day to discover the fire had burned right up to the edge of our community in one place after it jumped across the 8 lanes of I-80. Our maintenance workers were watching its progress very carefully from



a rooftop, and stopped it at the fence line using hoses and buckets.

"This very timely intervention meant that we suffered no destruction of property, and no injuries. Meanwhile, our thoughts are with some of our more rural areas, where residents, some with cows, pigs, horses, etc., are not yet allowed back after 9 days so far. Facing fire with animals is so much more difficult than just getting people to safety!"

Archivists discover valuable trove of first editions!

In a scholarly coup, two diligent researchers have unearthed important first editions of Pacifica Viola da Gamba Society's groundbreaking editions of Gamba News, dating as far back as the mid 1980s.

Former Pacifica Presidents Julie Jeffrey and Cindi Olwell, conducting archaeologically complex excavations in closets and cupboards, have recovered editions of the Gamba News dating back to the origins of the society.

"This is fully as significant as the discovery of the Rozanna-Rosetta stone," commented gambist Jeffrey, a professional librarian. "It may change the entire history of the gamba revival in the Bay Area."

"Perhaps we will finally understand why the chapter named itself after one of the smallest towns in the region," added Olwell. "Did we perhaps wish to appeal to surfers?"


The valuable documents, printed on multicolored paper and still bearing the postmarks and addresses of their original recipients, have been placed with society secretary Le Professore Nicholas Jones, who will undertake the daunting task of precision scanning and uploading them to the society's award-winning website.
