Wendy Gillespie is inexplicably attracted to polyphony (it turns out she had the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries conflated, but it all worked out). She started playing the viola da gamba a long time ago and has been playing for ~50 years, exploring most of the central early repertory of the viol.

Wendy has given master classes and workshops all over the US, and in Germany, England, Greece and Australia. She has also taught at VdGSA's Conclave since 1978.

She has performed on five continents, mostly as a founding member of Fretwork and a long-time member of Phantasm, both highly respected viol ensembles. Her name appears on more than 100 commercially released recordings.

Past President of the Viola da Gamba Society of America, Wendy received EMA's Thomas Binkley Award in 2011 and the Wellesley College Alumnae Achievement Award in 2012.

In 2017, after 32 years on the Indiana University faculty, Gillespie graduated to *Professor Emeritus* at its Jacobs School of Music. These days, she mostly wonders how we got projected so far into the future.

Your guide on this agricultural journey warmly recommends this music to all viol players, whether beginners or experienced.

You play one part, and magically you get bathed in melody and polyphony to the exclusion of all else, from Fretwork recordings. If you need to chill, choose a slower moving part and revel in the activity swirling around you. Need to explode? Play a fast moving part and add anything you like to it - invent a whole new way to farm!

You'll get all the parts and scores and can choose to play anything you like at any time (or hoe, or weed, or drink tea), and the piece will not fall apart. How cool is that?

For several pieces, you have alternate clefs to choose if you feel adventurous. Two of the six pieces we will play at pitch and then up a fourth. Why? We'll find out...

- 5. Once you register, Cindi, our Zoom host, will send out an email with a link to our Zoom meeting. She'll send another email reminder to registrants at 5pm the Friday before.

Membership is required in order to register for PlayDays— you don't want to miss them!

Muting your microphone

Your computer microphone is pretty sensitive, and if you are unmuted, it can pick up a lot of your background noise, like moving your chair or shuffling music.

 Find the button that looks like a microphone on the bottom left corner of the Zoom screen.

- If the microphone has a red line through it, you are muted and no one can hear you.
- If the microphone has no red line through it, your mic is live and every little noise in your room can be heard.
- To mute, click the mic icon (and then a diagonal red line will appear through the icon).
- To unmute, click the icon again. (It's a toggle switch: on/off/on/off...)

Chat

If you have a question or comment during the session, please enter it by clicking the Chat button, which looks like a speech bubble; it's at the bottom of the Zoom screen. You can send a message to everyone, to the host, or anyone else.


