Self-Rating Guide (VdGSA)

Read the entire list carefully, then circle the numbers of descriptions which apply to you (don't cheat!). The category where you have the most circles is your level.

Lower Intermediate (L.L.)

- Fewer than 3 years playing viol (unless already proficient on another stringed instrument and/or studying regularly).
- Need help with rhythm get lost easily, can't play with a metronome.
- Need more experience sight-reading in an unpressured situation.
- 4. Need help in tuning and adjusting intonation.
- Play one or two sizes of viols but need experience on one of them.
- 6. Read one or two clefs.
- Can manage andante tempi but "go to pieces" in an allegro.

Typical literature: Leetherland Pavan (JACO-BEAN CONSORT MUSIC [JCM], p. 153) at quarter-note = 60.

Middle Intermediate (M.I.)

- 1. Can hold down a part without getting lost.
- Can tune reasonably quickly with minimum of help.
- 3. Fluent in two clefs on one size of viol.
- Ability to "get around" instrument in first position at moderately fast tempi.
- Some ability to shape phrases musically.
- 6. Practicing regularly.
- 7. Some performing experience in a group situation.

Typical literature: Wilbye Fantasia (JCM p. 141) at quarter-note = 84.

Upper Intermediate (U.I.)

- Reasonably strong in rhythm and sight-reading so as not to get lost or throw off other players.
- 2. Ability to tune instrument and hear pitch discrepancies, and adjust accordingly.
- Fluent in two clefs and willing to learn a third, on one or two instruments.
- Ability to "get around" instrument in various positions at moderate allegro tempi.
- Ability to control bow so as to shape phrases and obtain musical nuances.
- Obtaining some private instruction during the year or at least practicing regularly.

7. Experience in performing in an ensemble.

Typical literature: Phillips Passamezzo Pavan (JCM p.155) at quarter-note = 63.

Advanced (Adv.)

- Soloistic capabilities and/or experience.
- Very strong sight-reader with strong rhythmic sense (ability to read difficult rhythms).
- Very good intonation and ensemble feeling; ability to adjust intonation to other members of the group and to compensate if another player misses a beat.
- Good sound and concept of musical phrasing; good rhythmic articulation.
- Fluent on main instrument in allegro tempi and in three to five clefs.
- Ability to play two or three sizes of viols and have instruments which blend well in a consort.
- Have knowledge of various styles of music, ability to ornament, octavate, play chords and do some improvising.

Typical literature: Ward In Nomine (JCM p. 148) at quarter-note = 69.

Regional Coordinator

Following is a biography of another of our officers pro tem, Luciana Lombardi (Monterey Bay coordinator):

Luciana has performed in, organized and led viol consorts and mixed ensembles, and given solo recitals in California (Davis, San Francisco and Santa Cruz) and in Indiana since 1974. She taught at UCSC for three years and has been a leading participant in the Santa Cruz Baroque Festival and the Antiquarian Funk since 1976. She studied with John Hsu, Wieland Kuijken and Peggy Sampson, among others. She participated in the first Seasoned Players Program at the 1987 Conclave, and looks forward to working with our new Pacifica Chapter. She often features "Music for a Viol" on her radio program (KUSP-89 FM).
