

The most important question facing the board and the society is, how can we attract new players or coax back the ones who have quit the society? Our survival rests on the answer. We will be conducting a survey of our lapsed members, but would also like you, please, to respond to the questions on this month's reply card.

The board decided to seek non-profit status through affiliation either with SFEMS or the national VdGSA. This is in part so that we can raise some money for the purchase of student instruments, of which we currently have very few. Our first action has been to set aside part of our treasury to begin a fund for this purpose.

What shall we do for the 1998 Berkeley Exhibition? Before we decide on any events, we want to involve the national Gamba Society as much as possible, and perhaps share a space with them for viol related events and displays. We will start to prepare media packets and persue what options we have to get media coverage for amateur viol playing. And we will start work on informational pamphlets for distribution at the Exhibition and afterward.

Finally, the board decided to keeps tabs on visits to the area by out-of-town viol players, so we might snag them for possible master classes, coaching sessions, lectures and so on. We will also try to organize consort meetings with a specific "theme du jour".

Elections to the Pacifica board (president, vice-president, treasurer, secretary, and members-at-large) will be held in June. Members should send in nominations on the reply cards in the next months' newsletters, but they must have the approval of the nominee before the name is put on the ballot.

FRETTING (says John Mark) about efficient tuning and pure thirds has been a way of calling attention to the problems of pitch that are basic to making a consort sound good. Accustomed as we are to equally-tempered intervals on modern instruments, the narrowed fifths, widened fourths and especially major thirds may be less tolerated when played without vibrato on viols with the usual graduated fret setup. If adjusting cadential major thirds by finger seems unreliable, another solution would be to reposition frets, as practiced by such consorts as Fretwork.

One enthusiast for relocating frets is Fred Reinagel, designer of the VioLab tuner, which is capable of sounding in 17 different temperaments. In response to my remarks on training our ears to use a single reference pitch for tuning, he wrote me a two-page letter in response. Without detailing our exchange since then regarding beats, cents, commas, widening fifths, etc. (which is available to anyone interested), Fred says he maintains his consort bass in 1/5 meantone temperament. Even if no one else readjusts frets, the consort plays more "in tune", he feels, providing that all members set their open strings to his fretted pitches.


Taking Fred's cue (and his tuner), I have been experimenting with two simple adjustments on my treble: splitting the first fret, and moving the fourth towards the nut, in order to try to obtain truer f#, c#, g#, and bb on the most frequently played strings. Only for pieces in three flats is the fourth fret returned to a higher position. For me, this compromise between equal and meantone temperaments allows playing much of the consort repertoire with fewer finger adjustments and is more in consonance with viols keeping "normally" placed frets. If professional consorts move frets, shouldn't more of us amateurs experiment with it also?

In honor or Valentine's Day a poem by member Judith Lyle York:

A lonesome viol's valentine
