

Joint Play with Recorders

Polychoral Venetian music and Muffat with the EBRS

Following a resolution to increase contact with other amateur early-music societies, passed at a Pacifica board meeting this Spring, recorder players from the East Bay Recorder Society will join us at our Nov. 13 meeting. Three morning consort groupings are planned: two polychoral groups at a=440, each with one choir of tenor and bass recorders and one of viols; and an advanced group at a=415, with alto recorders and voice flutes (tenors in D) taking the top lines. David Morris will coach, and will be available in the afternoon to coach smaller mixed consorts of recorders and viols.

The morning music for intermediate players is from London Pro Musica's "A due cori: Polychoral Music c. 1600" series, with the tenor recorders taking the soprano lines in the recorder choirs and the bass recorders taking the alto. (Recorders sound an octave above written pitch.) For LI-MI players, we have Pietro Lappi's Canzon decimaquinta, L'arborea á 7, for SSA + ATTB, from his Canzone da suonare published in Venice in 1616. "The pieces [in the collection] are mostly rather conservative, avoiding complex harmonies and virtuoso figuration," says the series editor. Beginning players may double. For MI-UI players, we have Giovanni Priuli's Canzone prima á 8, for SSSA + TTBB (+ BC), from his Sacrorum concentuum, Venice, 1618. This does have more complex harmonies and figuration, and also, unusually for its time, a tempo indication. For the advanced players, we have suites from Georg Muffat's *Florelegium*, of which David Morris swears not only that it works well with viols and recorders, but that it will move even finicky advanced viol players to remark, "You know, I rather like Muffat."

The recorder players, each of whom will pay a \$5.00 fee for the day to cover the costs of additional coaching time and music, will register via reply postcards distributed by the EBRS; additional postcards may be requested by sending email to your *Gamba News* editor at darv@sfo.com. Those playing at 440 might want to tune up the night before in preparation.


