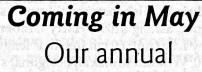

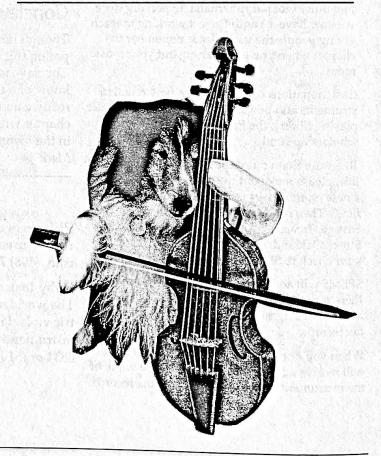

## The Era of Figured Bass and the Viola da gamba

May Workshop with Roy Whelden

Let's consider the following segment of music:



The bass line was written in the early 18th century. Most musicians would expect, reasonably, that there would be at least one sustaining instrument, perhaps cello or viola da gamba, playing the bass; and at least one chordal instrument, perhaps a harpsichord, playing both the bass line and adding the harmonies indicated by the numerical symbols.

But I've withheld some important information. This sample of music is from Handel's early oratorio "La Resurrezione." The composer indicated a very specific instrumentation for this aria: viola da gamba (con violoncello) senza cembalo. In other words, the viol is expected to function as the keyboard instrument does in the usual continuo combination: it must realize the harmonies implied by the figured bass symbols. Thus, while accompanying this tenor aria "Quando è parto," the violoncello and the viola da gamba are both responsible for performing the bass line, but rendering the harmonies is the responsibility of the viol.

This situation, where the viol is used to realize a bass line and add the harmonies indicated by the figures, is a characteristic of this particular oratorio, but is not all that uncommon in the Baroque repertoire in general. Indeed, some

of the earliest repertoire using figured bass was immediately taken up and performed by viol players with complete command of the new notation and its harmonic demands. Such is the case with Cacinni's Le Nuove Musiche of 1601, a collection which appeared within about a decade after the invention of figured bass. I would expect that most viol players of the time would have been prepared to realize solo viol accompaniments for the arias in Cacinni's collection, as well as to read and perform unfigured bass lines. The Baroque era has been called the age of the figured bass; certainly, figured bass notation or thoroughbass, as it is also called, is one of the most flexible and suggestive musical notations ever developed.

In May of 2005 I will conduct a workshop with the focus on continuo playing for viola da gamba players. The purpose of this workshop will be to (1) acquaint viol players with the principles of thoroughbass; (2) continued page 10

develop some facility in reading figures; (3) study some famous pieces of music which specify the viol as the performer of throroughbass (including Caccini, Handel and J.S. Bach); (4) study the use of figures in improvisation; and (5) examine some of the famous treatises on thoroughbass practice.

Roy Whelden is a performer on the viola da gamba and vielle, a composer and a music theorist living in the San Francisco Bay Area. He studied early music performance at the Indiana University School of Music, where he was a student and assistant to the early music legend, Thomas Binkley. Whelden is a founding member of the American Baroque ensemble which is known for its acclaimed performances of Baroque masterpieces and the premieres and recordings of many new works. Early Music America called Whelden "a key figure in the world of new music for gamba" and several of his compositions can be heard on recordings issued by New Albion. He is a proponent of extending the repertoire of the viola da gamba using 21st century idioms, as well as exploring the full range of the music of its past.
