Report on the Gamba Bande

The Gamba Bande of Pine Hollow Elementary School, Concord CA began as a result of an inquiry made by the Secondary Education Committee of Early Music America concerning educators who were interested in using early music in their curriculum. Ernie Ridout indicated his interest, and Lee McRae, Chair of the EMA Committee consulted with Pacifica Chapter and formed a local Education Committee, which located instruments and resources for him, as well as arranging for his own instruction.

Ernie introduced his students to the instruments with recordings and pictures. When the actual instruments were brought, they began with the bow and open strings, using ideas he had learned from Carol Herman's workshop (Pacifica Chapter, November 1989—ed.) They played gamba on alternate days for about half-an-hour, after which they would return to the modern instruments. Martha Bishop's Method was valuable; the introductory exercises and repertoire were ideal for young students with a strong

foundation in music. John Dornenburg came to the school twice to work with the students. He inspired them with his gentle manner, and their technique and tone improved noticeably. On May 16, the Gamba Bande participated in a school performance entitled Ancient and Future, a joint concert with students who had composed pieces for a computer music system. The Bande played four pieces from Martha's book (Tallis's Canon, The Song of the Ass, Shepherds Hey and a Praetorius dance), in a performance that was well received by parents and school administrators. They also performed for the student body as part of a Medieval Fest on May 18.

Ernie says that the students in the Gamba Bande enjoyed the experience tremendously, and the reaction from the parents was positive. From a purely musical standpoint, the results were quite good, and provide encouragement for continuing to develop early music education in the public schools.

(A note of appreciation to Lee, John, the Education Committee and the providers of time, instruments and materials to the project. Ernie is still involved in education, but is no longer with the public school system. We hope that projects of this kind will continue — ed.)


