Our viols submitted gamely to being tautened to an unaccustomed 440: half a dozen recorder players were introduced to viols by Julie Jeffrey, who coached them into a triumphantly sustained g-dg drone while the rest of us played Bach's Gavotte II (ou la Musette) from his third English Suite. A Musette by Couperin, involving a number of note changes, was reserved until next year. Fred Palmer and Peter Ballinger each conducted two polychoral pieces for the mixed ensemble of some thirty players. A splendid pot-luck brunch-lunch-tea was available during the day.
