Mary Springfels is a veteran of the American Early Music Movement, and has been given Lifelong Achievement awards by Early Music America as well as The Viola da Gamba Society of America.

She is a native of Los Angeles, but moved to New York at the age of 21 to join the New York Pro Musica as their viola da gambist.

From that time on, Mary has been an active participant in prominent early music ensembles, including the Waverly Consort, Concert Royal, the Philharmonia Baroque Orchestra, The Folger Consort (Washington, DC), Ars Lyrica Houston, and the Texas Early Music Project (Austin).

Mary directed the Newberry Consort in Chicago for 20 years, during which time the



group made a number of critically acclaimed recordings.

She has also been a continuo player for the Chicago Opera Theater, Central City Opera, and the New York City Opera. Currently, she is a co-director of Severall Friends, an early music ensemble based in Santa Fe.

Mary and James Keller have collaborated on a lecture course, *Orpheus in Music*, for Renesan Institute for Lifelong Learning. Mary has also spoken on The Medieval Tristan for the Santa Fe Opera Guild.

We'll be exploring some Tudor consorts: Two pieces by Robert Parsons - an Ave Maria and "A Songe Called Trumpets" - as well as "Dum Transisset Sabbatum" by Thomas Tallis.

In the 1620s through the early 1640s, two great composer-viol players- John Jenkins and William Lawes were well-paid colleagues with radically different styles. Lawes was forever experimenting, and Jenkins was content to perfect what he did. As both were virtuosic viol players, their music is challenging to the players, although in different ways.

"Jenkins or Lawes?" has become somewhat of a thing, as in "Beatles or Stones?," "Blue Collar or Dog Collar?," "Mescal or Scotch?," "Taylor Swift or Beyoncé?." So we are presenting an entire concert with just these two apex composers; you can choose your composer, or choose to stay on the fence, as you like.

In any event, we are sure you will agree on this: that Jenkins' and Lawes' six part consorts are clearly some of the finest music ever written for a consort of viols; this is really the music that dreams are made on.

How on earth did Handel write an opera in two weeks? How was it possible for Bach to produce a cantata every week? For that matter, did Telemann ever sleep or eat? These composers wouldn't have been able to complete works of such high quality so quickly by broodingly awaiting inspiration for the right notes — they had to use their craft! In this class, a simple method to understand the grammar and available "ingredients" of baroque repertoire will be presented.

We will try to understand the basic logic by which a phrase is constructed, and then we will then use this to model our own compositions after pieces in the repertoire.

An overview of a curriculum for further study will also be given.

Class will be recorded and available for 7 days after class for your review.

While the instrumental ensembles may be fixed for the weekend, every player will work with every instructor.
